

Europe's Roswell – 40 Years from the Crash (pp. 66–77)

In the first week of January 1983, farmer Irwel Evans discovered a large amount of metallic debris, one including a serial numbers, on his field at Llanilar near Aberystwyth, Wales. He assumed a UFO had crashed into some tree tops and was damaged like an eggshell before it flew away. Some of the debris was collected by researcher Gary Rowe, and a kind of metal sheet with a hexagonal structure has been analysed in 2023 by different institutes (with three different results). The author outlines the case and the futility of FOI requests and concludes that the object that lost the debris was a UFO. The complete case is discussed in Mark Olly's book *Europe's Roswell*.

An Abduction in the Year 1890? (pp. 77–81)

The author describes the strange experiences of a group of people with a shape-shifting, pale supernatural creature whose shenanigans only became known through hypnosis, and who had a pale face with large glowing eyes – or, simply said, Bram Stoker's novel *Dracula*, in which what the protagonist does closely resembles the modern tale of aliens and their bedroom invasions.
