

### **UFO AND UAP OBSERVATIONS (pp. 34–39)**

On 25 July 2013 at Neuenburg am Rhein, a man and his friend observed three stars in a triangle in the sky. These lights quickly approached the witnesses and hovered only 30 ft. above them. Each side of the triangle was about 10 yards long, the lights were brilliant but did not blind. Time stood still, animal sounds ceased, but after some time, the triangle moved extremely quickly to the left, then to the right in a zig-zag-movement, “like a ping pong ball”, then shot into the sky and vanished. The witnesses reported several indications of the so-called oz-factor, and a strange feeling of isolation. At the same date and time, there were at least five additional reports of three lights in the sky over the south of Germany. The observation is classed as GOOD UFO.

Addition to the case Friesenheim-Oberweier (see Jufof 277)

The report had stated that there had been no plane in the proximity of the registered UAP. This is not true, as a DHL plane was to the west at a height of 5000 m. Yet the traces of the UAP and the plane are separate, they are not identical.

### **UFO SIGHTINGS BY PILOTS AND THE C.R.I.D.O.V.N.I IN URUGUAY (p. 40–48)**

The author outlines the history of UFOs (called OVNIS) in the South American country of Uruguay since their first sighting on 13 July 1947 and the research associations that were and are active there. From the start, the CIOVO group had the cooperation of the country's Air Force. CIOVI stated they were able to solve 99 per cent of all cases. The author gives details of several solved and unsolved cases, and the further progress of civilian UFO groups like C.R.I.D.O.V.N.I. who also work with the support of the Air Force. C.R.I.D.O.V.N.I. has concluded that UFOs are a real phenomenon with a source unknown. UFOs do not obey the laws of earthly physics, mutilate animals, emit infrared light and can burn people who approach them too close. Finally, several pilot sightings are given as unsolved cases.

### **GHOST PLANES AND GHOST ROCKETS OVER SKANDINAVIA IN THE GERMAN PRESS (p. 48–58)**

The sightings of large planes and strange rockets over mainly Sweden and Norway in 1934 and 1946 were widely reported in the German and Austrian press. The author gives the main articles and explains in what context they were analysed at the time. The ghost planes were at first thought to be smuggler's planes, then Soviet spy missions, and finally there was a prevailing feeling they were hallucinations. Ghost rockets were mainly referred to as the beginning of the East Bloc's threat.
