

UFO AND UAP OBSERVATIONS (pp. 66–72)

A classical flying saucer was observed over Thürkow-Todendorf (Mecklenburg-Vorpommern) in 1995 but only revealed now as the witness knew no institution where she could report her experience. At that time, at 8 p.m., she was on a road between two villages when she saw a dark disc which emitted a brilliant downward ray of light. The disc, which now became blue, with rectangular portholes, crossed the road in front of her and continued on a zigzag path. It then disappeared and reappeared somewhere else. This case involves some strangeness as well as hints of the Oz factor, and the perceived object does not resemble any conventional stimulus. It is therefore classed as a Problematic UFO.

On 4 November 2024, a couple saw and filmed a red blinking light in the north-eastern sky at Brilon. This coincided with the night flight of a manned gas balloon in a distance of some 10 miles.

REACTIONS TO THE PASSIVE RADAR CASE 20240920B, FRIESENHEIM-OBERWEIER (pp. 73–85)

The case, from *Jufof* 277, was widely published on webpages both in Germany and internationally with many reactions and opinions. This piece lists the sites as well as the questions, and includes the answers by Josef Garcia, the chief investigator and owner of the passive radar. He stresses that neither a plane nor meteor could have caused the reading, and neither a kite with a tail. He also says it is impossible to judge the direction, height, and distance of the object from the reading as this would require at least three sets of passive radar sites. It is also undecided whether the radar detected three or only one object.
