

UFO observations (pp. 98-108)

This issue's observations include two close encounters of the first kind, as well as one PROBLEMATIC UFO. A woman spotted a dark, ball-like, metallic object which passed overhead just 20 m above ground on 22 July 2014 at Sande-Dykhausen. As no conventional stimulus appears to explain this sighting, it is classed as CE I and PROBLEMATIC UFO. For a longer period on 16 December 2013, an Augsburg man took over 80 photos of mysterious lights in the sky which appeared in strange formations. All these lights could positively be matched to planes approaching Munich and Augsburg airports, some of the images even show the anti-collision lights. An interesting case, again a CE I, was reported from Remscheid as having taken place in 1981: a large dark triangle appeared in the night, to this was attached a gigantic rotating disc of light. As the observation was made so long ago, the case is classed as insufficient data.

Neo-nazi conspiracy theory as a means to spread propaganda (pp. 109-121)

The author outlines how conspiracy theory had already been a means to spread antisemitic propaganda in the Third Reich, using, for example, the faked Protocols of the Elders of Zion, and how, in the post-war years, the neo-Nazi movement used and developed the theme of alleged Nazi Flying Saucer to spread and distribute material denying the Holocaust.
