

UFO-OBSERVATION (pp. 2–3)

Again, this issue contains a photographic case – and of a daylight disk! The image was taken from a moving vehicle on the A 6 motorway at Mannheim-Neuostheim on 3 December 2016. The female photographer did not see anything at the time and only wanted to take a picture of the sunset. A re-enactment of the scene showed that it was a construction site sign close to the car which became smeared due to the speed of the car.

OBSERVATION REPORT OF AND HINTS ON A GEOSTATIONARY OBJECT OF PRESUMABLY EXTRAORDINARY SIZE (pp. 4–21)

On 17 February 2015, an amateur astronomer took a photo of the night sky over Groß-Ammersleben in Saxony-Anhalt. The photo shows a spot in the sky, which is thought to be an unidentified geostationary object of c. 30 km diameter. The photo “suggests structures.” A second photo, taken on 20 February 2015 at Magdeburg by another amateur astronomer, is shown to depict an oblong object, also unidentified, which is 82 km in length.

UFOS, MISSING TIME AND CROP CIRCLES BEFORE THEIR TIME (pp. 22–27)

The author lists several reports of earlier ages which very much resemble modern UFO reports with things such as daylight disks and cloud cigars. While most of these pre-1900s stories are due to allegories, and natural phenomena such as northern lights or tornadoes, the author also includes an early example of “missing time” reported in a religious context, by no other than Graham Greene, and a crop circle, in Wiltshire, from 1966.
